Science Events



Cardiff TeenTech Festival

In December, 10 year a pupils attended the Cardiff TeenTech festival. During the day pupils got to experience different workshops and meet different scientists, engineers and technologists.

The first session allowed pupils to visit different STEM areas including, landing a virtual plane, learning about lasers and microscopes, using a VR headset, driving a mini forklift truck, making a moving hand from paper and straws, taking casts of teeth like a dentist would and learning about insurance.











Our second session was all about team work. Pupils had to build a dome from sticks. (Left)


Our third session was all about space and how exoplanets are discovered. Pupils even got to hold a meteorite that was 4367 million years old... older than the earth itself. (Right)



Our last session was all about pupils coming up with their own ideas on how to solve a problems. One team presented their BrainBot that would use AI to reduce student stress levels by helping them revise, coming up with revision timetables checking the quality of your work as well as setting reminders. The group got a special award for best digital innovation.












Swansea U

In January, year a triple science students group visited the Chemistry department at Swansea University. Firstly, we got to hear about the various careers that involve chemistry -there were so many, ranging from investigating crime schemes to discovering new medicines.







We then got to do experiments in the University laboratories. We found out that aspirin is an acid, paracetamol is neutral and morphine is an alkali. We then used sensing equipment to carry out a neutralisation practical. In our second laboratory session, we made aspirin by carefully following a method using specialised scientific equipment.

Our afternoon session was in the pharmacy department where we got to use stethascopes, measure our pulse rates and check prescriptions. We thoroughly enjoyed our visit!

Year 10 Pupils Visit New York



In February 2024, 16 Year 10 pupils had an amazing opportunity to travel to New York on an educational exchange trip. All pupils are either studying GCSE Art and/or PE. The purpose of the trip was to experience the educational system in a different country as opposed to ours in the UK, with an added bonus of amazing sightseeing experiences. In order to qualify for this trip, an application had to be made to Taith, which provides funding to enable educational staff and learners to spend time abroad as part of their studies. It also brings learners and educators from around the world to Wales.

Leading up to the visit, all pupils were involved in many fundraising activities. From October to February, bake sales were held every Friday in school. In December, a major raffle was held in school with prizes consisting of; Wales Rugby signed shorts, Netball tickets, Manchester United Football tickets, hair and beauty vouchers and many more! Additionally, the PE department organised in-house competitions for football and netball to raise money towards purchasing jumpers for all pupils to wear. In January, our pupils were able to attend our local Tesco for a bag packing day where pupils had the opportunity to speak to the local community and inform them of our trip. In February, staff members attended the local gym and took part in a boxercise fitness class which was a massive



success. Finally, we were fortunate enough to receive donations from the community which contributed to many tourist attractions. In total, we managed to raise over £3000! Without the support of the community and staff members, this would not have been possible.



Mid flight excitement

For some of the pupils, it was their first ever time on a plane and for some, their first experience out of Cardiff. Fortunately, Taith also supported any families with payments towards their passport or towards additional items needed. We flew from Gatwick and with British Airways who provided an exceptional service for the 8 hours we were on the flight! Then whilst in New York, our main mode of travel was the subway – which was crazy busy!!

Across 7 days, pupils visited Riverdale Country School for 3 days, went ice skating in Central Park, visited Madison Square Garden to watch the New York Knicks basketball match, went up the Empire State Building and had plenty of time to shop around Times Square. A highlight for the pupils was to visit the The World Trade Center. This was a moving experience for all and an opportunity to reflect on those who were killed in the 2001 attacks.

Flights and accommodation were covered by Taith, with only food needing to be bought. During our stay, pupils chose to eat at many restaurants and fast-food takeaways including Raising Canes, the Hard Rock Café and Ellen's Stardust Diner – which was fantastic to listen to Broadway singers whilst eating our food! Location was perfect, with us staying in Manhattan – so perfect for walking to Times Square!



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All pupils thoroughly enjoyed it and have quoted it as "a holiday to remember". Staff Members Miss Evans and Mr Camilleri who were responsible for leading the trip have stated how amazing and well behaved all pupils were and are a credit to our school. Future plans are now involving Riverdale Country School to attend MIHS as part of the exchange and the GCSE Art pupils using their photographs taken in New York towards their projects in Year 11.
